

Social Media Accessibility

Web accessibility refers to inclusive practices that enhance inclusivity for people with disabilities by removing barriers that prevent their full engagement and navigation with social media.

Social media platforms such as YouTube, Twitter, Instagram LinkedIn and Facebook serve multiple purposes such as sharing information, building community, and engaging in social and political practices. It is highly recommended that we add closed captions for videos and use descriptive texts for clarification when sharing information or providing links.

Closed Captioning

Closed caption (CC) is the text version of spoken language, and sound effects from videos, television programs, video footages and movies. Closed captioning helps deaf and hard of hearing individuals to understand content and spoken language of social media.

Making YouTube and Facebook videos accessible

Below are some guidelines to increase social medial accessibility for people who are deaf and hard of hearing and people who use screen readers and voice recognition softwares.

1. Choose appropriate closed captioning software

It is important to note that Automatic Closed Captioning software often mispronounces words, produces inaccurate spellings and misrepresents the spoken content.
